# Winter Happenings at Spring Valley

Bison's Bluff Grand Opening & Earth Day Celebration Saturday, April 22 10 a.m.-2 p.m.

What better day to celebrate the opening of Spring Valley's new nature play area than Earth Day! Following a ribbon cutting ceremony, parents will be taken on short tours of the site to learn about its unique play features and the benefits of nature play. Kids, of course, will be able to explore each of the play features and play to their heart's content. The day will include additional hands-on activities, refreshments, and more! Admission is free for all ages.

# Bison's Bluff Nature Playground FAQs

#### What are the hours the play area will be open?

- APRIL OCTOBER 9 a.m.-7 p.m.
- NOVEMBER MARCH 9 a.m.-4 p.m. (weather permitting)

# Is there a fee to use the play area?

- Just like all of Spring Valley's facilities, use of the nature playground will be available free of charge to all visitors. The only exception would be for scheduled special events, when admission fees may be charged.
- Site users will be able to make donations to support the on-going maintenance of the nature playground and Spring Valley in general at a donation kiosk planned near the entrance.

### Are there any restrictions on use?

Mostly, children will be restricted only by their imaginations and abilities! *Parents and caregivers MUST supervise and be attentive to children at all times, while letting them play freely.* The following are prohibited at Spring Valley:

- Pets
- Bicycles, skateboards, scooters, etc.
- Beverages in glass containers
- Collecting plants or animals
- Consumption of alcohol
- Smoking not permitted in playground



#### May groups reserve space in the play area or schedule a group visit?

Organized groups may visit Bison's Bluff; however space cannot be reserved for this public facility. Due to this fact, it is recommended that groups be limited to 50 at any time, since there will be others using the play area at the same time. Groups should call ahead to inform staff of their plans to avoid exceeding the play area capacity. This will insure a fun and safe play experience for all.

#### What is a nature playground and how is it different from a typical park playground?

- Many of the play elements (climbing features, slides, physical spaces) are either constructed entirely of natural materials or are constructed to mimic natural features such as logs, boulders, a flowing stream, etc.
- A nature play area is designed and landscaped to more closely resemble a natural area.
- Play features are often designed in such a way that their function is more open-ended, i.e., they can be used in many different ways, dependent on the imagination of the child.

#### What features are available at Bison's Bluff?

- A bluff designed to resemble a natural rock outcrop which features a large bison and slides leading to the base
  of the bluff.
- Climbing structures and towers resembling a multi-tiered tree house.
- A meandering shallow stream fed by a waterfall with log crossings to encourage agility and balance.
- A re-created shallow wetland traversed by stepping stones.
- A beaver lodge children can crawl into and help to build.
- Artistic area where children create with mud and sand or weave with natural materials.
- Musical area for creating sounds with wood and metal percussion instruments.
- Hidden nooks for hiding and sitting quietly.
- Benches, logs, and boulders for sitting.
- Sand and water play area.
- Rocks and minerals exploration area.
- Soft, resilient surfaces beneath climbing structures to protect active little bodies.
- Winding pathways leading through the site and to each of the features.
- Informational signs to help guide children and parents to make the best use of natural play opportunities.

#### What are the benefits of nature play versus other types of active play?

- Nature play areas provide opportunities for open-ended, creative, free play in a natural setting. Many adults can
  recall playing in streams, building forts, climbing trees, etc. from their own childhood. These opportunities are
  unavailable or extremely limited for most children today due to over-scheduled lives, technology, and parental
  concerns about the safety of un-supervised play.
- Studies show that children benefit physically, cognitively, socially, and emotionally from imaginative play in natural settings.
- Studies show that children who spend play time in natural areas are more likely to appreciate nature and develop curiosity about nature.

## Bison's Bluff Construction Update!!

Spring Valley's new nature play area is 98% completed; however, the onset of winter weather has delayed the final completion. Some work will continue over the winter during mild spells of weather, but it is not anticipated that we'll be able to open the play area for any use until sometime in March. The official grand opening event is scheduled for **Saturday**, **April 22**, **2017**.

### Spring Valley Winter Fest – Saturday & Sunday, January 14 & 15, 12-4 p.m.

Celebrate the beauty of winter at this event, which will feature indoor games, crafts and activities as well as snowshoeing, horse-drawn wagon rides, live animal presentations (including a live WOLF!), and a bonfire. Admission is \$3/person or \$12/family; kids 3 and under are free. All activities take place in and around the Nature Center.

#### Embrace Winter's Beauty – Snowshoe Rentals

Snowshoes can be rented at Spring Valley anytime there is at least 4 inches of snow present. Rentals are available daily from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. Cost is \$4 for a three hour rental. Snowshoes can also be taken offsite for \$10/day. Call the Nature Center for updates on snow conditions.

# Winter Campfire in the Cabin – Saturday, February 4, 6:30-8:30 p.m.

Enjoy a short evening hike down to Merkle Log Cabin, where you'll gather around the fireplace and enjoy stories, songs, hot cocoa, and learn a few pioneer skills. Fee is per family of four - \$10/residents or \$15/non-residents. Pre-registration is required.

# Sundown Supper in the Sugar Bush – Saturday, February 25, 4-6 p.m.

Experience the time-honored American tradition of maple tree tapping! This special program allows each family to tap a tree, gather maple sap, and experience the syrup boildown during a short hike, and then retreat to the cozy Merkle Log Cabin for a pancake supper featuring real maple syrup. Fee is per family of four - \$35/residents or \$50/non-residents. Additional family members require an additional fee of \$7.50. Pre-registration is required.

## Cub Scout & Girl Scout Saturdays - Saturdays, January 7, January 28, & February 18

### **Nature**

The calendar year is winding down, even as day's light starts to lengthen. The time of later dawns and earlier dusks is past, and the sun's long climb above the horizon begins. Still, winter has taken hold, and ice and snow and gray winds will dog our voyage through the cold months ahead.

The shift in light/darkness ratios and the drop in temperature have produced a response in plants and animals that protect them from the change in seasons. Diminishing light spurs bird migration to places still abundant with insects, open water and growing plants. A few mammals, like the groundhog and some species of bats, hibernate, reducing body temperature to a whisper above permanent cold. Their life candle barely glows, slowly burning the food they've stored as body fat.

Insects, being cold-blooded, lack internal temperature regulation, and cold slows their metabolism. Survival for some means moving into a life stage where they can rest and wait out the cold. This means entering the winter as pupae, after spending summer and fall as grubs or caterpillars, and emerging in spring as adults. Other insects migrate, from ground level to below, from above the water to beneath and from shallower water to deep, where it is warmer, with temperatures more stable than where exposed to air. Some burrow into logs or crawl beneath rocks. Others slip behind bark or move in with us indoors.

But even in winter there are insects that stay active. Sometimes winter's sun warms through the snow to expose the leaf litter beneath. The surrounding snow may be covered with what appears to be a scattering of small black specks. A closer examination will reveal thousands of tiny insects called springtails. They are commonly called snow fleas and inhabit soil surfaces often numbering in the millions per acre.

The stone fly is another insect that has adapted well to winter. Found only in clean running water, certain species have larvae that grow throughout the fall and early winter. The adults emerge to mate in mid-winter and lay eggs in the water.

Winter lacks the activity of bustling spring, growing summer and the brief hurry of fall. But there are compensations. Its nighttime sky blazes brighter, and few warm-weather birds match the frolic of swooping juncos or equal the jaunty cheer of a gang of chickadees. And sometimes, when the sky is a bright blue and the air is as clear as crystal, that can be enough to forget the cold.
